Visas & Passports:

- (1) Travelers with US passports valid for more than six months do not need to obtain a visa to enter the country, if the duration of stay is less than one month. This includes travel for business, tourism or in transit. This also includes US citizens with visas or entry stamps from other countries. [\(source here\)](#)

Dress Code:

- (1) The UAE, and Dubai in particular, is very diverse and cosmopolitan. The country is accustomed to welcoming travelers from a variety of religious and national backgrounds. However, in order to avoid extra attention, both men and women should adhere to a modest, business casual dress code when in public. Generally, it would be wise to wear clothing that covers the shoulders and knees.
- (2) The dress code is more relaxed inside of hotels, restaurants, and resorts that serve international tourists.
- (3) If the opportunity presents itself to visit a mosque, both women and men should wear clothing covering their arms and legs. Women should also be prepared to wear a hijab (head scarf) inside of the mosque.

Alcohol Consumption:

- (1) Alcohol is served throughout Dubai mostly in hotels and restaurants frequented by international tourists. Alcoholic beverages are not to be consumed outside of those establishments, such as on the street or in vehicles. [\(source here\)](#)
